2.	Approval of Previous Meeting's Minutes: The minutes 26 th January 2023 were APPROVED.
3.	Matters arising:

a. Barbican Centre Strategy Group. Little progress to report but Adam is trying get a meeting with the Town Clerk. The Policy and Resources Committee claim to be supportive but the idea was not the meeting agenda earlier that day.

(Adam, Mark and Randall will follow-up.

- b. Roy Sully of Shakespeare, has agreed to become the Secretary.
- c. The Summer Party will not to proceed as nobody has stepped forward to help Ted who cannot manage it on his own. Naresh Sonpar, CC of Lauderdale is organising a Coronation Party.

- d. Ted feels there is little need for a barbican-wide Assistance Line as each block appears to have a robust system to help vulnerable neighbours.
- e. Nobody has offered to succeed Jim as Membership Secretary. Fionnula and Ted felt that the MemberMOJO database being used by some house groups might work well for the BA as a whole. It would be worth investing BA funds in a robust system.

4. AGM on 27th April:

Claire Spencer, the new Barbican Centre CEO, will speak.

Suggested change to Constitution (paper attached) agreed Nem Con.

Brenda, Sandra, Ted, Fionnuala, Tony, Randall and Jane volunteered to help on the night.

5. Accounts

Tony's report is attached. Total funds were £ 181,685 on 31st December 2022.

Tony is looking at alternative deposits to achieve a higher rate of interest.

Sandy suggested a policy be established to define how much money was needed to be kept on call, how much at short notice and how much could be placed on longer-term deposit.

6. **Barbican Quarter Action (BQA) Report:**

Report is attached. Randall reported good news inasmuch as the City were proposing to obtain expressions of interest to re-use existing buildings. This did not guarantee anything but was a great advance. The City still wishes to wring £50million of value from the site. City will not go for planning until expressions are returned and considered so no planning application likely before the Autumn. No developer will commit without a clear and certain date for vacant possession. The Museum currently has 450,000 artefacts beneath the existing buildings with no immediate plans to shift them to the poultry market.

Fionnuals said that rising interest rates and high inflation were an additional deterrent to a developer taking investment risks with the site. The supposed buyer/occupant for the new buildings does not exist.

Adam is confident that the BQA had no immediate need to call down further funds from the BA. If the planning application went to judicial review, it might cost a further £60k but at that stage a separate appeal for funds could be made.

Mark reported progress on the City being persuaded to create a cultural strategy that would embrace LWW, Smithfield , the new Museum site and the barbican.

7. RCC Report

- a. Sandra Jenner said the BEO working group, having reviewed all the evidence submitted, was now concentrating on options to implement recommendations. The group meet again on 30th March. This was tricky business as any changes may impact on employees.
- b. A clear plan was needed to communicate recommendations simultaneously to all interested parties, including the BAGC.
- c. Ted reported funding being made available by the City to trial individual control of heating. A pilot in Wallside was likely.

The Corporation had issued a paper on Delivering the Residential Reset which proposed improving communication between the Corporation and the 8,600 (or so) City residents, the greater number of whom live in the Barbican.

Adam will liaise with other RTAs to establish a joint response to the proposals.
